4. The Stand by Stephen King

Obsessed with the daily Ebola headlines? Grab this 1,400-page monster about a government-created superflu that offs 99% of the world's population.

5. Song of Kali by Dan Simmons

The occult and fantasy collide in this horror story about a writer who moves his family to Calcutta to investigate a long-lost poet.

6. Hell House by Richard Matheson

Stephen King has said this is "the scariest haunted house novel ever written." What higher praise do you need?

7. The Loved Dead by C. M. Eddy

A creepy tale of necrophilia. As if there are other kinds of necrophilia?

8. Something Wicked This Way Comes by Ray Bradbury

A carnival – led by the fully tatted and aptly named Mr. Dark – comes to town the week before Halloween. Fancy a carousel ride?

9. The Raven by Edgar Allan Poe

The opening line "once upon a midnight dreary, while I pondered, weak and weary" probably jostles your cobwebbed memories, but if you haven't read it since high school, now is the time.

10. The King In Yellow by Robert Chambers

"True Detective" obsessives may know this supernatural book-within-a-book tale about a play that drives its readers insane. Yay!

11. Turn of the Screw by Henry James

An atmospheric gothic novella about a governess, two orphaned kids, and are-they-or-aren't-they ghosts. (Let us know if you figure it out.)

12. The Great God Pan by Arthur Machen

After reading this most twisted of horror books about a demented doctor and human-monster hybrid, you will likely be delaying any planned surgeries.

13. The Killer Inside Me by Jim Thompson
